

# HALLOWEEN MATCH UP

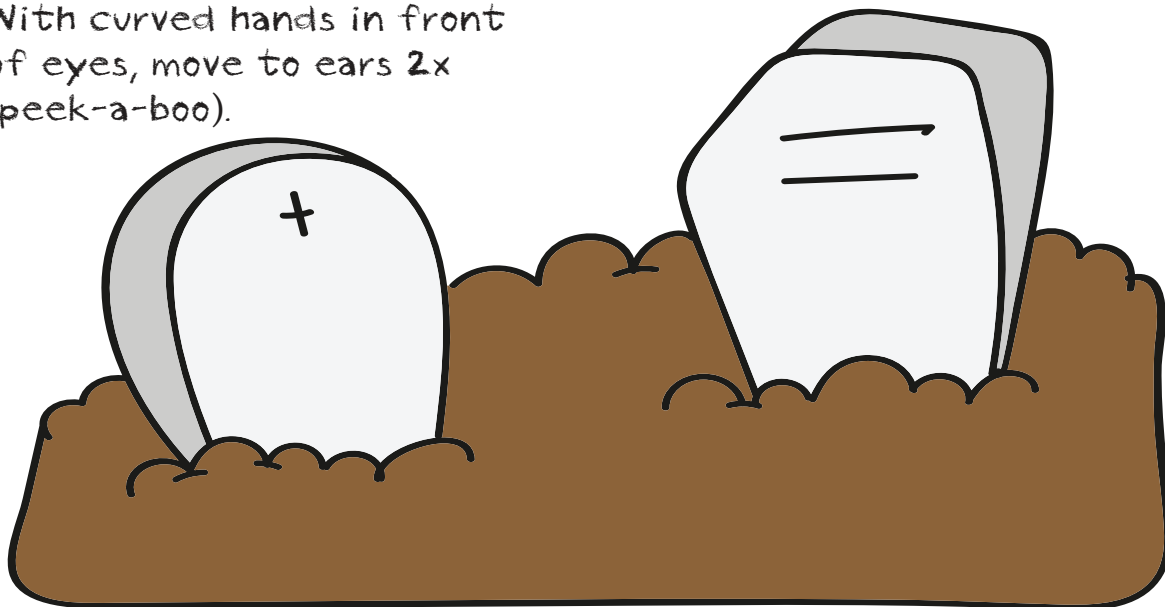


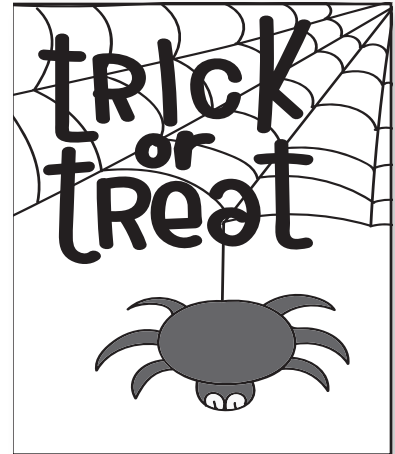
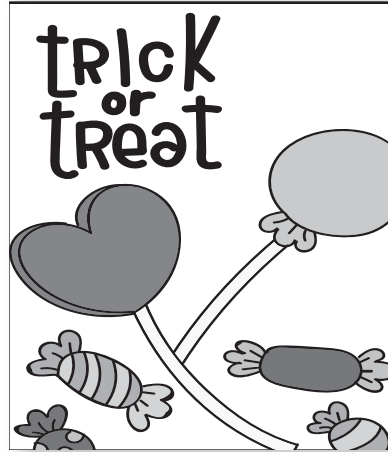
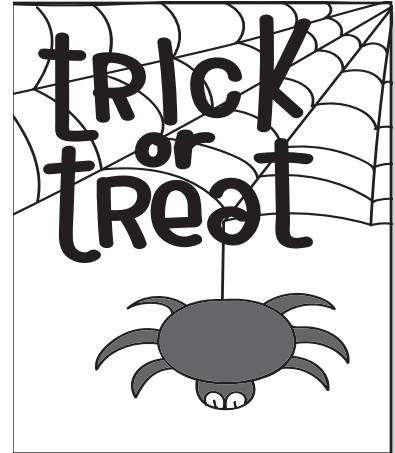
Sign Halloween:

## Directions:

Print on cardstock and cut out on the picture side.  
Use the black and white version for children to color.

1. Mix up the cards.
2. Lay them in rows, face down.
3. Turn over any two cards.
4. If the two cards match, keep them.
5. If they don't match, turn them back over.
6. Remember what was on each card and where it was.
7. Watch and remember during the other player's turn.
8. The game is over when all the cards have been matched.
