- 3. **My Family Rings.** Children have fun making their own family rings. We suggest making the IDs to match their family members for times of emergency by writing names and numbers on the back. Online, have kids wear the clothes of someone they made a ring for and introduce themselves as that person, giving the phone #.
- 4. **Who I Live With.** Children can have fun learning signs and drawing their own fami Online, invite 911 Dispatch to share with the kids how to be ready for an emergenc Ask 911 to let your students to a practice call with them.

- c. Someone touches you in private places
- d. Crossing the street
