

Color the temperature gauge to match the clothing of our tiger friends. Use the big temperature gauge as a guide.


Craft: Make a temperature gauge with movable red paper.

Idea: Weather station dramatic play.



Write the temperature and color the thermometers to match the temperature for the morning.










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Five-Day Thermometer Temperature (Afternoon)









Five-Day Thermometer Temperature (Evening)

6. What was the temperature on the coolest day?







7. What was the difference in degrees Fahrenheit between the warmest and coldest temperatures?

Temperature Guage Craft

Right pointer finger slides down behind left finger 2x.

Directions:


- 1. Cut out each thermometer piece.
- 2. Cut the thermometer along the dotted lines.
- 3. Insert the red slider piece into the thermometer's bottom incision.
- 4. Insert the white slider piece into the thermometer's top incision.
- 5. Glue the white piece's tab to the red piece to join them together.
- 6. Mark the temperature using the pulling handles on the slider's ends.

Ideas for the Temperature Gauge Craft:

Option 1: The teacher can call out the temperature and the students make their thermometer show that temperature.

Option 2: Teachers can use pictures of real weather and have the students show what they think the temperature is for that image with their thermometer. (Images of different degrees can also be used.)

Option 3: At the start of this game, students' thermometers will be set to zero dgrees. To make this a more interactive game, teachers can use a deck of cards (use the 1-9 cards). Shuffle the deck and lay it face down. The students take turns picking a card to see what how much they need to move their thermometers to match the card. Red cards indicate that the thermometers must move in a negative direction. Black cards indicate that the thermometer will rise. The student who gets their thermometer to the boiling point first wins.


