
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# Shapes

Your set of three dice cubes with icons, ASL signs, and printed vocabulary words provides a fantastic opportunity for a variety of engaging and inclusive language learning games.

# **Game Dice Ideas**

## **Roll and Respond:**

- Roll the three dice.
- Students take turns signing or saying the word that corresponds to the icon, sign, or word on the dice.
- This game reinforces vocabulary recall and pronunciation.

### Sentence Creation Challenge:

- Roll all the dice to get the icon, ASL sign, and printed word.
- Students create a sentence that incorporates the vocabulary word and say or sign the entire sentence.
- Encourage creativity and complete language usage.

### Word of the Day Dice:

- Each day, roll the dice to determine the "word of the day" for the class.
- Throughout the day, encourage students to use the word in sentences, discussions, or activities.

### **ASL Charades:**

- Roll the ASL sign dice.
- Students take turns acting out the word silently.
- The rest of the class guesses the vocabulary word.
- After everyone has guessed, sign the correct answer for the class.

### Simultaneous Signing:

- After rolling the dice, everyone in the class simultaneously signs or says the word.
- This creates a dynamic and engaging activity with a focus on quick recall.

### **Creative Storytelling:**

- Roll the dice and use the results as prompts for a creative storytelling session.
- Students take turns incorporating the icon, ASL sign, and printed word into a collaborative story.

### Mix and Match Challenge:

- Roll two dice and challenge students to create a sentence.
- This promotes a deeper understanding of the vocabulary.

### **Expressive Communication:**

- Roll the dice and have students sign the word, fingerspell it, and provide an explanation or definition.
- This activity enhances expressive communication skills and vocabulary comprehension.

- This can be done individually or as a relay race with teams.

# **Role Play Roulette:**

• Students roll the dice and, engage in role-playing scenarios using the vocabulary word, ASL sign, an icon for context.

# **Multi-sensory Stations:**


• Set up stations around the classroom where students interact with the vocabulary in different ways matching icons, practicing ASL signs, and using the words in sentences.


