

We are accustomed to meeting people with hearing: exchange of names (which are not often remembered), a handshake, minimal eye contact. The unspoken rules are a little different when meeting a deaf person.

Be prepared to sign this information when you first meet a


deaf person.

Use this guide to practice signing with a partner. Give yourself a check mark when you feel you are comfortable to sign each item.

A quick review on the WH, Yes/No NMM. Here are two possibilities of what you may encounter.

English: "Are you deaf or hearing?" ASL: YOU DEAF HEARING, WHICH?

This is a wh-word question because it requires more than a yes or no answer. Signer includes eyebrows down, body leans forward, and holds last sign.

English: "Are you hearing?" ASL: HEARING YOU?

This is a yes/no question. Yes/no questions require only a yes or no answer. Signer includes raising their eyebrows, body leans slightly forward, and hold last sign.

Name Signs:

Name signs are used to identify a person and eliminate the need to fingerspell a person's name repeatedly. There are three kinds of name signs used by Deaf people--arbitrary, descriptive, and a hybrid of both. Arbitrary name signs use the first letter of the person's name. Descriptive name signs are based on one of the person's physical characteristics.

In deaf culture, it is proper to announce your departure. When you are ready to leave, for whatever reason, be sure to say where you are going, and if you're not coming back, let them know that too.
