QUICK TIPS

Here are some points to consider to get set up easily and quickly.

1. Learning with the children can be a collaborative experience to explore the language together—a great way to build relationships and create a positive learning environment.
2. Start with basic signs that are easy to learn and use daily. For example, include signs for greetings, emotions, and everyday objects.
3. Incorporate it into your daily routine, such as during attendance, greetings, marking the calendar, weather, the alphabet, practicing colors or counting, and giving instructions.
4. Use visual aids such as posters or flashcards to help everyone learn and remember signs.
5. Label everything so children can associate written words and signs with objects.
6. Make it fun by incorporating games and activities that involve sign language to make it engaging for students.
7. Begin an established sign time to learn new things.
8. Replace hand gestures with real signs when singing, especially for school assemblies.
9. Encourage peer practice times to reinforce learning and build community in the classroom.
10. Connect with the deaf community in your area and invite them to come and share their experiences with your students.
11. Consider asking your school or local group to sponsor a membership at ASLTR to get the resources you need for success.

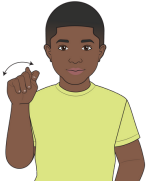
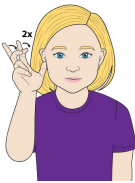
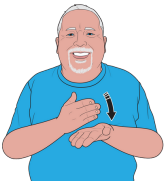
